

The Dragonfly Cafe is situated on a large lake and is part of the Lower Moor Farm Nature Reserve. Unfortunately the weather was overcast so we did not see it at its best, but on a sunny day it must be a very beautiful and relaxing spot. We certainly filled the cafe and with good coffee, cakes to die for and friendly service, everyone seemed to be enjoying themselves.

The La Strada Italian restaurant is on the B4361 between Swindon and Avebury. It used to be a pub (can't remember the name) but which was boarded up for a number of years. It has now been totally renovated and everyone seemed to be impressed with the food, a reasonably priced lunch menu and friendly service. We will come again!

Visit to Arkells Brewery, Swindon - 15th Feb

Unbeknown to most of us the visit to Arkell's brewery in Swindon, organised by Rob Ambler, coincided with the brewer's 180yr anniversary and the launch, on the day we visited, of their celebration ale named Tradition. We and other people on the tour, were some of the first to sample Tradition and as you could drink as much as you want within the £10 visit fee, we had ample opportunity to try it out - verdict from me, 'well if your asking I'll have another please'!

The tour started with an enthusiastic history lesson by Alex Arkell who, in 2012, took over as head brewer and is quite rightly very proud of the family business since being started 180yrs ago by farmer John Arkell. This was initially to keep his workers 'hydrated' and happy, but soon grew into a business of its own - farming never stays still! One of his early purchases was a furnace to feed the steam engine which he bought from a certain Isambard Brunel Swindon railway works!

Following Alex's talk some of our party went on the first tour whilst others carried on sampling their ales and joined Alex Arkell on the second tour. By his own admission Alex is a 'brewing nerd' but for those of us on his tour this was definitely a plus point as we learnt a lot not only about brewing, but about the method use by Arkell. They are founding members of a club of only 10 remaining steam breweries in the UK and whilst it is now mainly electrically driven much of the equipment is still belt driven. They do also use the original steam engine occasionally.

The only down side to having Alex lead our tour, or maybe it was all the questions we kept asking, was that we were late for the food, most of which had already been devoured by those who came before! It was good to come back to our local craft brewer, learn so much more about the process and their history, and of course sample their beers! A great visit and thanks again to Rob for organising it.
