Black and White Villages Tour 13th &14th June 2024

Thursday, 13th June, Ash and I sat with other FCCC members in the Royal George at Birdlip, enjoying a coffee whilst browsing our route instructions for touring the pretty Black and White villages of North Herefordshire.

Before 10am, in a variety of cars we headed off following the tulip diagrams, some more successfully than others! Due to ineffective communication between navigator and driver, we overshot the sharp right turn and consequently missed mid-morning refreshment at the Cheese factory! We were later told of the delicious cheeses!

The route took us through attractive scenery, pretty villages, over a bridge with toll house, through the village of Dilwyn and passed the family farm, where Geoff grew up. After 60 miles we arrived in Weobley and drove up the broad main street of quaint houses to Ye Olde Salutation.

Over a hot lunch we reflected on the journey. Everyone had arrived in good time, enjoyed the scenery, the black and white houses and stops en-route. Ash was relieved that the Bristol was running well after he had spent the winter tuning the engine and upgrading to silicone brake fluid.

The afternoon drive took us past the Credenhill Military base, HQ for the SAS and into Hereford for a tour of the Cider Museum. I think we all learnt something new about apples and cider making and most enjoyed a 'taste' at the end of the tour! Judging by the fact that we were still purchasing goodies at 4.30pm when volunteers were closing the museum, this was a very successful visit.

A short but slow drive out of Hereford, through the pretty black and white village of Eardisley took us to Kington and our hotel for the night. Dinner was a sociable event and after a good night's sleep I was one of the few who had an early morning swim in the hotel pool. Departure from the hotel was not until 10.00am and so breakfast was leisurely! Delicious Eggs Royale for me!

Friday morning found us in the attractive village of Eardisland where an antique AA box and dove cote sat alongside the River Arrow. We were told by a local resident that the dove cote was probably never used by doves but by the ladies from the house for refreshments. Today, it is a small heritage museum and the community shop from which several FCCC members bought fresh local strawberries! Looking over the river bridge we watched House Martins collecting mud from the river bank to make their nests.

Food was always high on the agenda of this tour and by midday we were driving on towards Leominster for lunch at Grange Court, a former market hall built in 1633 but moved to its present location in 1859. It was used as a house until the 1930's and is now a thriving civic and community building. Several of our group admired the Leominster in Stitches display showing a history of the town through the ages. After a delicious lunch in a 5th floor ceremonial room, Jill thanked Geoff for planning and leading this very successful tour and presented him with a card and gift in thanks.

Just a short drive from Leominster was our final visit of the tour, to Hop Pocket Garden Centre and Shopping Village where we browsed plants, craft materials, gifts and antiques. Many of us succumbed to a purchase or two! Then after 'farewells' and 'safe travels' we all independently headed for home, to view our photos, reflect on the scenic villages and consider further 'tinkering required' on the classic car!
