FAIRFORD STEAM SHOW - 17/18 AUG '24

Last year Steve Evans and his team performed a miracle in bringing back to Steam Show back to Fairford after 10yrs and making a success of it, even though the weather all weekend was iffy and the public car park flooded on the Sunday! The reaction to the show was so positive that many more exhibitors and visitors booked early for this year's show.

I believe there were around 29 full size engines at the show this year, plus an equal number of smaller ones, plus lorries, tractors, army vehicles, Wall of Death and on the Sunday, a guest appearance of Henry Cole and TV crew on his 'bric a brac' stall (Motorcycle Show, Shed & Buried etc).

This year the FCCC had the responsibility for organising all the Classic Cars and such was the interest that by February over 160 cars had entered. Sensibly it was decided that we should reduce this to 130, given the space available, which included around 20 FCCC cars on the Saturday. Thanks to Keith Handley a plan off action was drawn up and the Fairford Mens Shed made a large number of signs and marker posts (also for the whole show) and on Saturday we organised the parking of around 130 cars and 80 on Sunday - thanks especially to Keith, Steve/Harry Harding, Chris Landa-Font, Martin Blackmore and Ash/Pam Holmes for their 'parking patience'. The Classic Cars were in a prime position directly opposite the parade ring, with the FCCC display across from the ring entrance. Unfortunately the parade for the cars coincided with lunch time and many groups could be seen enjoying their 'champagne and caviar' lunch, however, with a bit more cajoling we did get a good turnout on the Sunday, which went down well with the spectators.

The feed back locally and on Social Media following the Fairford Steam Show has been very positive and I understand that the 16/17th Aug has been confirmed for 2025 - see you there!
